Watching the Olympics this summer, I was incredulous when Simone Biles announced that she was withdrawing from competition to focus on her mental health. Incredulous because she fought against society’s definition of a hero, a status she earned after winning five medals in the 2016 Rio Olympics. With that decision, she clinched her superhero status by honoring the dignity of her person, by having the courage to fight the status quo of what was expected of her (to compete/perform/win) - when she chose her mental wellness over the potential to amass yet another Olympic medal. **To me, she became a shining example of the heroes we need versus the heroes we typically look toward.**

And those whom we look toward are typically at the forefront - medaled, monied or titled. But what about the *unsung* heroes among us, the heroes we *need* - those on the sidelines, who typically operate behind the scenes, to ensure that our delivery of care/service model continues uninterrupted and unabated? Heroes

beyond the hospitals, beyond the celebrity? They're all fighting the same pandemic with skill sets just as indispensable and protocols just as integral to the healing process.

Take Dave Sanders, for example. He's our senior director of physical plant services at St. Ann Rehabilitation & Nursing Center in Dover. When asked why he shows up to work day after day in the midst of this pandemic, putting his life on the line to serve the needs of the residents, he simply replied, *"It's what we do. We have a responsibility to care for each other in this world and that's what I'm committed to."*

When asked the same question, Mark Gambeski, a warehouse manager for the NH Food Bank, who was instrumental in coordinating the food distribution for 72 mobile food pantries throughout the state last year, replied, *"I'm just trying to do good things for my own community and to give back, to support the common good. I also want to be an example to our younger staff."*

And there is Roxanne Ashby, the ADNS at Mt. Carmel Rehabilitation and Nursing Center in Manchester, who stated, *"I love our residents and staff and I'm not going to abandon them; the thought of that makes my eyes water and my stomach flip, not in a good way. I work in long-term care because I love the people and what I do; I'm not going to let a pandemic hold me back."*

Wow. Three wonderful examples of our many servant leaders and heroes who will never be recognized in the national spotlight but heroes we need versus those we typically look toward. We share additional examples in the pages of this booklet.

The words of Pope Francis support this, addressing the "heart" of each of our workers, when, from a New York Times opinion page last November, he writes, *"Whether or not they are conscious of it, their choice testified to a belief: that it is better to live a shorter life serving others than a longer one resisting that call. They are the saints next door, who have awakened something important in our hearts, making credible once more what we desire to instill by the work that we do. They are the antibodies to the virus of indifference. They remind us that our lives are a gift and we grow by giving of ourselves, not preserving ourselves, but losing ourselves in service"*.

To all of you who support our work, I *deeply* appreciate your self- sacrifice and your contribution to help edify, stabilize, nurture and heal those in need. There are many heroes among us, like *YOU*, like our direct care staff, social services and those providing back office support services all across the organization, who help keep things running smoothly. There's also our incredible board and committee members, volunteers and our many benefactors who continue to believe in us and the tremendous value and impact of our work. Honestly, the work that we do is *only* possible because of *YOU*. You all make me so proud and continually humbled by your courage, resilience and resourcefulness and how you've adapted – and responded - during this precarious time! I'm so grateful for each of you - for your magnanimous heart, your selfless service, and your unrelenting love.

Heroes Among Us

A healthcare worker sacrificed for her children and refused to give up

There was no doubt in Susan’s mind. She calls last year the “scariest” time of her life, and this comes from someone who moved halfway across the world with her family to a place they’d never been before.

For this healthcare hero, her story is one of overcoming adversity; a confident woman who remained squarely focused on her children, caring for others and building the career she dreamed of – even in the face of crisis and loss.

Susan was born and raised in Kenya. She loved her home but knew her three children – who she proudly describes as “having hearts of gold” – weren’t getting the education they needed. Plus, she

had always dreamed of a career in healthcare but had limited options. In her words, “I really want to serve and help people who can’t help themselves.”

She felt the United States would provide them with the opportunities they lacked. In September 2019, Susan was selected for the Diversity Visa program lottery. Less than two months later, she and her children arrived in Manchester.

Susan wasted no time pursuing her ambitions. She enrolled in classes to become a licensed nursing assistant (LNA), eventually landing her first job at Mt. Carmel Rehabilitation & Nursing Center in January of 2020, working in the memory care unit.

She loved her job, instantly bonding with residents and staff. Her children were acclimating well to school and their new home. Things were going better than she could have ever expected.

March 2020 changed everything. COVID-19 quickly threatened the senior living industry, with little warning and time to prepare. Several of her colleagues quit over fears of getting the virus. But Susan and others stayed on, sacrificing their own physical health to protect so many seniors, even if it meant working longer hours, spending less time at home with the kids and donning personal protective equipment for hours a day.

“I really want to serve and help people who can’t help themselves,” she kept reminding herself.

While Mt. Carmel was fortunate to stay ahead of the virus the first two months, it had its first outbreak in May, with 31 residents and seven staff members testing positive. Susan was one of them.

Thankfully her symptoms were mild, but she had to stay home and quarantine for 14 days. That was extended to 28 days because her children’s daycare wouldn’t allow them to return because of exposure.

Out of work for four weeks, Susan still maintained an income, but not as much as she would have received if she had worked that entire month. She quickly fell behind on rent and was running out of food.

The financial and emotional toll became too much. She talked it over with management at Mt. Carmel. A day later, there was a knock on her apartment door. It was a culinary staff member from Mt. Carmel with boxes of food. Through the Catholic Charities NH Crisis Fund, Susan also received a gift card for food and assistance to pay for daycare. This gave her some financial flexibility so she could afford rent.

When she returned to work, she learned that many of her residents that she had cared for every day – and grown to love – passed away. “I remember sitting down and crying for a long time,” Susan said.

Susan sought counseling through the Catholic Charities NH Employee Assistance Program (EAP), which she credits with helping her better cope and keep a hopeful perspective for the future.

In the months that followed, Susan never backed down. She navigated remote learning with her children, stayed on top of her bills and maintained everyday responsibilities around the home. At work, she continued to do all she could to keep her residents smiling and safe.



And she didn’t lose sight of her career ambitions. This past Spring, on the recommendation of Mt. Carmel’s Director of Nursing, Susan was among seven Catholic Charities NH LNAs selected to receive the Pathways scholarship to attend a full-time LPN degree program, made possible in part through donor support. Her dream of becoming a nurse will now happen much sooner than she expected.

Susan is a faithful woman, and she’s confident that faith will carry her and her family forward.

Her message to Catholic Charities NH donors: “Thank you from the bottom of my heart. The support over the past year has given me peace of mind, both in ensuring there will be food on the table for my kids and allowing me to focus on the career I love so much. You impacted our lives in such a positive way.”

Amid all the loss and challenges, Susan never gave up. If that doesn’t define a hero, what does?

Heroes Among Us

A volunteer stepped up big time for homebound & isolated seniors

See a need, jump in and help.

Few things embody the spirit and mission of Catholic Charities NH more than a volunteer springing into action to assist a neighbor in need. Amy-Lynn Sullivan is one of our many volunteer heroes, compelled not by obligation, but by a desire to make someone's life better, going above and beyond over the past year to bring hope to seniors impacted by COVID-19.

When the pandemic began last year, many reports of seniors suffering from isolation or being unable to secure rides to medical appointments began to surface, catching the eye of Amy-Lynn Sullivan, who knew right away that she had to help. She soon located and contacted CareGivers, the Catholic Charities NH program that provides rides, food deliveries and emotional support to homebound and disabled seniors in Greater Manchester and Nashua, enabling them to maintain their independence and stay connected.

"I've always believed that if you can help somebody, you should," Amy says. "Volunteering with CareGivers is a way for me to assist people who may not be so quick to ask for it. These seniors are holding onto that last shred of independence, and it isn't easy for them."

Amy-Lynn joined the CareGivers volunteer corps last May, ready to roll up her sleeves wherever she could.

"When I started, I made reassurance calls to check in on seniors who were feeling more isolated," she recalled. "Then I discovered more ways to help, and began providing rides for clients to medical appointments, the grocery store, or anywhere else they might need to go, through the Caring Rides



program. I also started delivering food to local seniors through the Caring Cupboard mobile food pantry program."

It didn't take long for Amy-Lynn to recognize just how big an impact she was making on the lives of the seniors she was serving. As important as the groceries and medical appointments are, so much of this volunteer work is about personal interactions.

"I had a client whom I assisted with rides to her dialysis appointments," she remembers. "When she would exit the dialysis center after her appointment, she would smile as she saw my car waiting for her; it was nice to know that she felt safe and was happy to see me. When you become a regular driver for someone, you get to know them well. During the rides, she would talk about her family and what's going on in her life – we formed a strong connection."

“During this pandemic, isolation was a massive concern for seniors and clients were nervous to leave their homes,” Amy-Lynn adds. “They also weren’t comfortable, or couldn’t afford, getting on a bus or calling a cab so they end up reaching out to CareGivers as a last resort to get somewhere like the doctor’s office. What would happen if a senior couldn’t get to their medical appointment? CareGivers shows up for those clients and provides a real sense of security for them.”

Volunteers like Amy-Lynn provide that security, made possible through the support of our donors. It’s a true team effort, without which CareGivers wouldn’t be able to carry out its mission.

“Without CareGivers, many New Hampshire seniors would be making tough decisions like choosing between paying for heat or paying for groceries,” Amy-Lynn says. “CareGivers relies on donations and volunteers to keep running – it’s the people who are willing to donate their time and resources that help seniors maintain that sense of self, wellness and independence. That is very valuable!”

Amy-Lynn continues to make an incredible impact on the seniors she has served and highly recommends this rewarding vocation.

“The best thing about CareGivers is that you can volunteer around your schedule and do however much you can accommodate into your own life,” she says. “It’s hard to put into words, but there’s nothing better than knowing you’ve helped somebody. Whether you’re the first person to speak with them that day – or are there to give or receive a smile – I think the best word to describe that feeling is fulfillment.”

Our Place helps families prepare for – and face – life’s challenges

Real change can occur when you ask for help. For Rebecca, life with her infant child was quickly becoming overwhelming and reaching out for assistance was the best thing for her young family, although she never imagined just how life-changing that decision would be.

Up to that point in her life, Rebecca, a native of Weare, had managed life’s transitions, good and bad, with relative ease. When a disappointing chronic injury forced her to give up her career working at a bakery, Rebecca found another passion in providing care for individuals with disabilities. Soon after, she met Kyle, the love of her life. In October 2019, Kyle Jr. (KJ), a healthy nine-pound baby, was born.

While she loved being a new mom, it required some adjustment. She was struggling with breastfeeding and managing the physical and emotional demands.

“There’s no manual for being a parent,” Rebecca shared. “There’s so much to do – going to various appointments, learning to provide for your children and making sure you do what your doctors tell you to do. While I wouldn’t change a second of it, it can be incredibly challenging.”

There was the increased financial responsibility of raising a child. Even with another job change that offered growth potential, Rebecca and Kyle faced increasing costs of diapers, clothing and other



essentials that quickly ate away at their budget. They knew they couldn't do it alone, so Rebecca did a Google search that she calls fate.

Our Place and Catholic Charities NH came up on the screen and she soon connected with the program's supervisor, Karen Munsell, who explained the education programs and resources offered by Our Place.

"Rebecca was highly motivated right from the start," said Munsell. "She was eager to learn all that she could about being the best mother she could be."

Rebecca attended 1:1 parenting sessions with Munsell and with Jean Ann St. Pierre, the program's nurse educator, acquiring tools to better manage the many responsibilities of parenthood and plan for the future. St. Pierre provided breastfeeding support, while Munsell helped Rebecca understand KJ's developmental milestones.

"They allow you to stay one step ahead, troubleshooting before trouble happens," Rebecca marveled. "They help me understand things that you don't think of until you're in that moment."

She and Kyle also participated in Our Place's support groups, where she loved to get together with other new moms, share advice and serve as sounding boards for each other.

"It was nice to meet and be around others facing similar challenges," she said.

KJ was just five months old when the COVID-19 pandemic began, and Rebecca was three months into her new job when she transitioned to full-time remote work, doing her best to balance work and childcare like many families endured in 2020. Kyle kept his job installing flooring, but there was the constant fear of COVID exposure that could be brought home.

Fortunately, with all of the questions of safety, job security and the family budget strain swirling around her, Rebecca knew where to turn for help.

Our Place was there for Rebecca during the pandemic with direct assistance, providing diapers, wipes and other items, in addition to parenting education and support groups remotely. Munsell also referred her to mobile food pantries set up by the New Hampshire Food Bank. And through the donations from Manchester-based Wadleigh Starr & Peters PLLC, Rebecca and her family received a Thanksgiving basket of food and gift cards to help them during the holidays.

"Never could I have imagined raising a child in a pandemic," she shared. "Our Place is always willing to help out. They've become a second family for me."

Rebecca also worked with the Our Place team to develop a Life Plan, a series of goals designed not only to make her a better parent, but also to address other crucial areas of life, such as finances, to foster more stability for her family. Currently, she and Kyle are working on their goal of saving enough money to buy a home.

Rebecca is truly grateful for all of the support she has received, knowing Our Place services are made possible because of the generosity of our donors.

"You're making a positive impact on my life and the lives of so many others in the community," she says. "You're providing families – your own neighbors – with everyday knowledge and necessities, turning rough spots into more manageable situations."

As KJ approaches his second birthday, Rebecca feels that, even with the uncertainties that life may throw at her, the future is bright for her family.

"Our Place has given me and Kyle the knowledge, resources and courage to remain positive," she adds. "They've instilled the confidence to know that we're doing the right things for KJ and everything will be okay."

Catholic Charities NH Year-in-Review

Crisis Fund Responds to Urgent Assistance Needs

Since 1945, we have responded to individuals and families in crisis, but never before was the volume and magnitude as high as it was over the past year. But thanks to our donors, we were able to be there for those in need.

A key part of this rapid and nimble response was the establishment of the CCNH Crisis Fund, which provided direct assistance, on a case-by-case basis, to individuals and families across New Hampshire most impacted by times of crisis. More than \$410,000 was raised, with funds going toward emergency financial relief for individuals and families struggling to make ends meet, food assistance for homebound and disabled seniors, access to teletherapy for low-income individuals seeking mental health counseling, and other forms of urgent assistance. Because of your support, more than 1,065 individuals of all ages and backgrounds across New Hampshire benefited from this assistance and were able to better navigate these uncertain times and find a path of hope for the road forward.



Catholic Charities NH Acquires Guardian Angel Thrift Shop

In November, Catholic Charities NH deepened its footprint in the North Country, acquiring the Guardian Angel Thrift Shop in Berlin. Guardian Angel is a volunteer-driven nonprofit offering a wide range of clothing, collectibles, furniture and other household items. Sales proceeds support emergency assistance needs among residents of the Greater Berlin area.



An Event Unlike Any Other: Virtual Mardi Gras Nets \$189,000

While we were unable to put on our beads and dancing shoes this year, the pandemic didn't stop us from getting together for a great cause on February 16. Our Virtual Mardi Gras Gala netted nearly \$189,000 to support New Hampshire residents facing hardship and crisis. The event featured special guests, including Bishop Peter Libasci from the Diocese of Manchester, a Fund-A-Need segment and other entertainment. It wouldn't have been

Pathways Program Helps Make Dreams Come True

For many New Hampshire residents, a lack of financial resources and other barriers may inhibit them from pursuing their strong ambitions. But thanks to a new program launched through Catholic Charities – Pathways – the dreams of building a rewarding and fulfilling career may soon come true for many.

The Pathways program, made possible in part through donor support, offers unique career and development advancement initiatives for those seeking a career in healthcare who otherwise may not have had access to these opportunities. Pathways includes full financial assistance for entry-level candidates pursuing a Licensed Nursing Assistant (LNA) license, select full-tuition scholarships for LNAs looking to attain their Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN) degree, and other select scholarship opportunities for those seeking their Registered Nurse (RN) degrees, as well as on-the-job training. The program is available to employees of Catholic Charities NH skilled nursing facilities.



Liberty House's Center for Veterans Becomes Reality

The next phase of growth for Liberty House became a reality, with the construction of the program's new Center for Veterans. The 2,000-square-foot space provides Liberty House residents and community veterans with a dedicated space for community programs, recovery meetings, job skills seminars, art therapy, recreational activities and space for them to get together and support each other. The creation of the Center for Veterans was Phase II of Liberty House's "Mission Renovate & Restore" campaign, which also included the expansion of the program's food and clothing pantry.



NH Nonprofit of the Decade

Catholic Charities NH was named the 2020 Education/Nonprofit of the Decade by Business NH Magazine and the NH Association of Chamber of Commerce Executives. 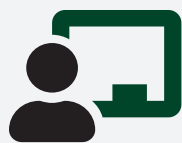

Report To Our Community

2020 was a year unlike any other – filled with unprecedented demands and challenges. However, one constant was the incredibly generous support from all of you, our friends and neighbors. Throughout New Hampshire and beyond, we saw your support in the form of extraordinary selflessness. Even though we couldn't physically be together, you had our back through donations, calls, cards, meals, and so much more. The generosity of our community is something we have always been in awe of, and we were humbled by the amazing ways NH came together for those struggling with food insecurity during the pandemic. Your support was critical to our efforts throughout 2020 and continues to be as we contend with COVID's lasting impact. **Here are a few of the many ways you helped us further our mission in 2020:**

Elimination of Shared Maintenance Fees

As a result of the incredible generosity of our friends and neighbors in 2020, the NH Food Bank was able to achieve a long-time goal. As of June 1, 2021, shared maintenance fees for our approximately 400 partner agencies were eliminated. This will save our agencies – like food pantries, soup kitchens, emergency shelters, school programs, senior programs and more a combined \$400,000 each year, allowing them to better focus on meeting their communities' needs.

Project Community: NH Together from Home

When WMUR partnered with iHeartRadio to host a live special event to help support the NH Food Bank during the COVID-19 crisis, we couldn't have imagined what a profound impact it would have on our organization. The fundraiser, which included NH celebrities, musicians, athletes and more, resulted in our ability to provide approximately 3,650,146 meals to those in need in New Hampshire during a time of great uncertainty and unprecedented demand. 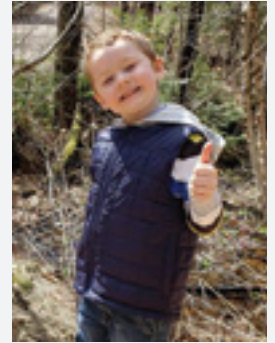


Culinary Job Training Kitchen Perseveres

Despite not having as many students and volunteers due to a temporary pause in programming to help limit the spread of COVID-19, our Culinary Job Training Kitchen increased the NH Food Bank’s available meal inventory from around 7,000 meals a week to about 35,000. Our culinary team was also called upon several times to provide immediate meal replacement for nursing homes whose staff were ordered to quarantine. These orders covered two meals a day for two weeks at a time. Thanks to your generous support of our programs, we continue to be able to meet these challenges.

Your support came in many forms - that included cards, calls, meals, and creative fundraisers, which inspired and humbled us all. We received heartwarming notes from NH residents - kids and adults alike - from all corners of the state wanting to make a difference in the lives of their neighbors who were struggling.
